

BACKGROUND

Free Hill was a community of free Black residents established in the 1850s in Athens, Tennessee. For nearly a century, Free Hill sustained a mainly Black population until urban renewal drove out the families who called it home in the 50's and 60's. The project, known as The Graham Street urban renewal project, displaced those families to allow for the expansion of Tennessee Wesleyan College, now known as Tennessee Wesleyan University.

This exhibit explores the recollections of Free Hill residents, their descendants, and invites others to listen, learn, and remember.
